

Jewish Memorial for Montabaur

The town of Montabaur will soon have a memorial dedicated to the Jewish victims that were murdered during the Nazi regime. The plan came about at the end of last year when the town council decided in favour of the conceptual design made by Hans Bernd Olleck, a sculptor and a resident of Niederelbert, and determined that the Großer Markt would serve as the location for the memorial.

The Decision

The decision made by the town council was a difficult one, as the project was not only about producing a dignified and appropriate memorial to the Jewish victims of the Nazi regime, but also a work of art. The question about choosing the right location also had to be factored in. A call for bids was put out by Dr. Regina Fiebich, director of the town archive, who wrote to a number of artists, and in the end received eight conceptional designs. A jury that included Judith Röder (artist), Dr. Markus Wild (art historian) and Paul Widner (former history teacher and former member of the town council) discussed the entries. The jury agreed on a limited number of entries, which were then submitted to the town council, with the names of the artists being removed. During multiple rounds of voting the council members finally chose the conceptual design by Hans Bernd Olleck, sculptor and resident of Niederelbert. Olleck wished to have his memorial project installed to the right entries of the entrance to the old town hall. The town council agreed to this location. „In my opinion it is exactly the right place because this was in fact the point where the Jewish citizens were rounded up and from which they were deported by the Nazis.“ stated Klaus Mies, Montabaur’s mayor.

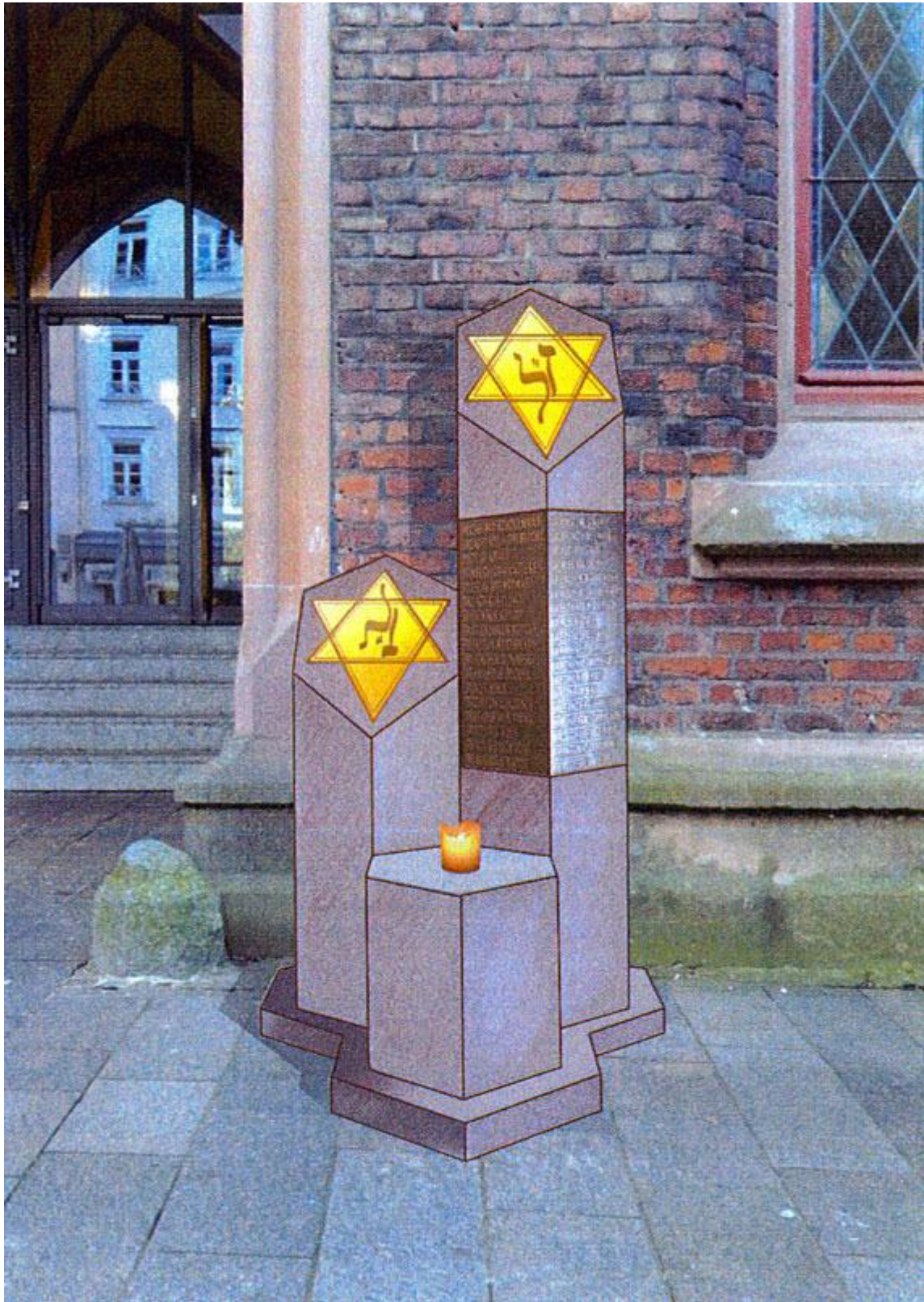
This followed a discussion about the question as to whether the inscription on the memorial should be extended so that it would read "on behalf of all victims of the Nazi regime". However, a majority decision in principle had been made by the town Council in December 2012 that the inscription will read "Memorial to the Murdered Jewish citizens of Montabaur". That decision was upheld.

The Concept

The design by Hans-Bernhard Olleck consists of three steles of varying heights, all of which are to be made from Weidenhahner trachyte stone. They are hexagonal, stand on a 10 centimeter high pedestal, and have heights of 42, 105 and 170 centimeters respectively. The two main pillars have sloping surfaces one of which will be embossed with the bronze Star of David and the Hebrew inscription "Z" L" (= Zichrono Livracha, or blessed memory). The star and inscription on the mid-sized stele will be inverted and engraved into the stone, whereas both will be raised on the large stele and the writing will be right side up. "This fuses form and content like an inner

bond between the pieces because one view both as one single stele that represents a timeline that was divided by a break or cut. It is as if a rod was broken. With this break I wish to demonstrate that the events of November 9th, 1938 broke up something that belonged together, "Olleck writes in his exposé. A bronze plaque displaying the names of the 25 Jewish victims of the Nazis will be installed on the two sides of the largest stele. The top of the smallest stele is horizontal so that candles, flowers or other tokens may be placed there. With the majority opting for Olleck's design, the proposals from the ceramic artist Martin Görg from Höhr-Grenzhausen and the Montabaur artists' project „Zeitraum“ were no longer considered be considered, but they can be viewed here:

The monument will be erected in the fall of 2013, and will be dedicated on the 75th anniversary of the Kristallnacht, "Night of Broken Glass, on November 10th.
